Studio News

Kim Kaytor has a schedule of listed firings posted just inside the studio door. With so many new & enthusiastic members, she is working on streamlining and organizing the firing of your work. She has posted signs in the kiln room labelling shelves for green ware, bisque to-be-glazed pots and pots needing to be collected by you. Please help to keep things moving and pick up your work.

Kiln Maintenance & Repair

I recently attended a meeting of the Arizona Clay Association. The demo was on Kiln repair & maintenance. I picked up a few valuable bits of information.

Kiln elements are made with nichrome wire. When replacing your elements, keep the extra length that you trim off to use for pins to anchor coils. Insert these pins mid-brick at a 60° angle. Kilns & particularly element channels should be vacuumed regularly. Over time elements become brittle and tend to bulge out of the channel in spots. They are resistant to being pushed back into place. My 'aha' moment: When your kiln is unplugged or circuit breaker turned off, heat the bulged section of element wire with a propane torch to red hot, then gently push the element back into place using pliers. Remember, old elements are brittle, so do this carefully because if the element breaks, it has to be replaced.\$\$. The heat from the torch makes it less brittle.
